Please remove all decorations, including lights, tinsel, ornaments and tree stands. No artificial trees or wreaths will be accepted.

Recycling your tree helps reduce landfill waste and protect the environment by returning organic material to the soil.

In recent years, Union Township has recycled more than 300 trees, supporting the community's commitment to sustainability.

TruCraft is proud to play a part in projects that make a difference close to home. Recent highlights include Eastgate Station, both TQL additions, and Cincinnati Children's Eastgate facility, each representing collaboration and growth within our community. TruCraft also contributed to the restoration of the Cincinnati Nature Center's Krippendorf Lodge and updates at West Clermont Middle School, supporting spaces where families, students, and neighbors come together.

Rod's daughter, Olivia McIntyre, took a moment to give us an inside look at TruCraft and share what makes TruCraft unique.

### What defines TruCraft's identity as a family- and veteran-owned business in Union Township?

## Union Township Prepares for Winter

Preparation begins well before the first snowflakes fall for Union Township crews. Trucks are inspected, plows and salt spreaders are tested, and supplies of rock salt and brine are stocked early in the season.

As winter storms hit, plow crews are dispatched when conditions require attention and are heavy enough for plowing. Union Township is divided into 13 snow plow routes to cover over 130 miles of roadways. The Service Department treats the main thoroughfares first in each route before addressing subdivisions and additional roadways. Crews typically take approximately three hours for each truck to complete a full route. Please provide plow trucks plenty of room to operate, always staying back at least 100-feet (approximately seven car lengths).

Union Township is comprised of highways, county roads, and Township roads. A collaborative effort is put forth from the Township, Clermont County Engineer's Office, and Ohio Department of Transportation to cover the entire area.

Residents can also help the process run smoothly. Whenever possible, please avoid parking on the street during or leading up to an anticipated snowfall. Parked vehicles can slow down plowing operations and make it difficult for crews to clear the entire roadway.

Portable basketball hoops, trash cans, and other obstacles should be moved out of the roadway before snowfall begins. Items left near the curb may be damaged by plows as well as cause damage to plows. Items like basketball hoops do not allow efficient removal of snow for you and your neighbors.

With teamwork between Township road crews, ODOT and Clermont County road crews and the community, the Township can ensure that winter weather is handled quickly, safely, and effectively.



# Heating and Fire Safety Tips for the Season

As temperatures drop, many households turn to space heaters, fireplaces, and furnaces to keep warm. While these heating sources make our homes cozy, they also increase the risk of fires and carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning if not used properly. Follow a few safety tips to keep your family warm and safe all winter long.



## Use Space Heaters Safely

Space heaters can quickly warm up small areas, but they're also a leading cause of home heating fires.

- Keep space heaters a safe distance away from other items. Always place space heaters at least three feet away from anything that can burn, such as curtains, bedding, or furniture. Never leave space heaters unattended. Turn heaters off when you leave the room or go to sleep.
- Plug space heaters directly into the wall. Avoid using extension cords or power strips, which can overheat.
- Inspect each space heater before use. Check cords for cracks or fraying and ensure the heater has an automatic shut-off feature in case it tips over.



## Install and Maintain Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless gas produced by burning fuel in furnaces, stoves, fireplaces, and vehicles. Exposure can be deadly and can occur from faulty or improperly used fuel-burning appliances.

- Install CO detectors on every level of your home and outside each sleeping area.
- Test your detectors monthly and replace batteries at least once a year.
- Replace the entire unit every 5 to 7 years, or as recommended by the manufacturer.
- If your detector sounds an alarm, get everyone outside immediately and call 911.



## Keep Your Chimney and Fireplace Clean

A warm fire in the fireplace is comforting, but creosote buildup can lead to dangerous chimney fires.

- Your chimney should be inspected and cleaned by a certified professional at least once a year.
- Burn only dry, seasoned wood. Wet or green wood creates more creosote and smoke.
- Use a screen or glass door to keep sparks and embers from escaping.
- Dispose of ashes safely. Place cooled ashes in a metal container and store them outside, away from your home.



## General Heating System Maintenance

Your central heating system needs attention, too.

- Schedule annual maintenance for your furnace or boiler to ensure it runs efficiently and safely.
- Check vents and flues for blockages that could trap exhaust gases inside your home.
- Keep combustible items away from all heat sources.



## In Case of Emergency

Make sure everyone in your household knows how to use a fire extinguisher and where to find it. Develop and practice a fire escape plan, including two ways out of every room. Reach out to the Union Township Fire Department if you need help creating a fire escape plan.

By taking a few simple precautions, you can stay warm and safe this winter without putting your home or family at risk.

# Building the Future

Union Township continues to experience strong commercial growth, with numerous projects underway or nearing completion across the community. From new restaurants and retail spaces to major healthcare and recreation facilities, the local economy remains vibrant and on the rise.

Retail and restaurant activity continue to thrive throughout Union Township, with several new businesses under construction or preparing to open soon. A new Dollar General is taking shape at the former car wash site on Old State Route 74 in Summerside and is expected to open in February of 2026. Taqueria & Tamaleria Nuevo Leon, a Texas-based Mexican restaurant, will soon open at the corner of Ohio Pike and Glen Este Withamsville Road, adding another dining option to the area. Clean Eatz, located near Jungle Jim's, and Pigskins Bar & Grill at 455 Old State Route 74 in Mt. Carmel are now open. Panda Express has begun construction next to the Union Township Library.

Meanwhile, Wawa construction is progressing, with the store opening this month. The property on the corner of Ohio Pike and Bennett Road is under new ownership, with plans to remodel and expand into a convenience and wine store. Additional development includes a small strip mall at the corner of State Route 32 and Mt. Carmel Tobasco Road on Yates Lane, where site preparation activities have begun, and Alfaa has purchased property at Aicholtz Road and Eastgate Boulevard with plans to begin construction within the next few months.

Major mixed-use and commercial projects continue to enhance Union Township's economic landscape. The Cove, a 16,000-square-foot mixed-use commercial center located adjacent to the Eastgate Boulevard and Ferguson Drive roundabout, is currently under construction. The development will feature first-floor retail space, a drive-thru restaurant or coffee shop, and second-floor office space, with substantial completion expected by this coming spring. In addition, Honda East in Cherry Grove has begun expanding its operations, with the new building anticipated to be completed in the spring of 2026.

Significant progress is being made in the areas of healthcare and education throughout Union Township as well. Cincinnati Children's Hospital recently opened at 4315 Ivy Pointe Boulevard, bringing approximately 500 new jobs to the community and serving an estimated 600 patients per day. Nearby, the new VA Clinic on Ivy Pointe is nearing completion. Also, on Ivy Pointe, Primrose School is moving forward with plans for their new headquarters location north of Sharefax Credit Union.

Industrial, recreation, and infrastructure developments continue to strengthen Union Township's growth and community amenities. Rumpke has begun site work on a \$12 million indoor waste and recycling transfer facility located off Round Bottom Road, on Champions Way. The new facility will feature public recycling stations available for year-round use, with construction expected to be completed by early 2026. Nearby, Cincinnati Sands Volleyball is planning to build just north of Hamilton Safe on Round Bottom Road. With Township permits already issued, construction is anticipated to begin soon, and the facility is expected to open in spring 2026, adding a new recreational opportunity for residents and visitors alike.
